







 are held once a month in a different slum of Nairobi

A.2 Ante Natal Medical Camps

• Where: Slums of Nairobi North-East

• <u>Since</u>: 2014

Overall Objective: Guarantee and improve access to pre and post-delivery assistance

• Beneficiaries: Young mothers (14 -25 years old) with no/limited access to basic antenatal and post

natal care



A.3 Community-Based Rehabilitation Program



- <u>Where</u>: Peripheral gyms located in the slums areas of Babadogo, Korogocho, Kariobangi, Kahawa/Soweto, Mathare.
- Since: 2005
- Overall Objective: To reduce child disability in Nairobi slums
- Specific objectives: (a) Disability prevention and rehabilitation;
 (b) Improving life conditions of children
 with disabilities
- <u>Beneficiaries:</u> children with disabilities and their families
- Activities:
 - Physiotherapy and occupational therapy sessions
 - Orthopaedic/corrective surgery for eligible cases
 - Awareness creation and fight against the social "stigma"
 - Training at community and facility level

A.4 HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAM

<u>Where</u>: Government or informal schools in the slums of Babadogo, Korogocho, Huruma, Mathare, Kariobangi, Kahawa/Soweto

<u>Since</u>: 2005

Overall Objective: To improve the health status of the youth living in a challenging

environment

Specific Objective: Promotion of a healthy life style among adolescents at risk

Beneficiaries: School pupils, their parents, teachers and communities

Activities:

 Awareness creation through information sessions, and psycological counseling by a specialised team of social workers.

- Seminars for parents, teachers and administrative staff of the schools
- Awareness creation through Public Rallies



A.5 SAFE MOTHERHOOD PROGRAM

<u>Where:</u> 35 (target) governmental and informal schools in the slums of Babadogo, Korogocho, Huruma, Mathare, Kariobangi, Kahawa/Soweto.

General Objective: Promotion of reproductive health and safe motherhood among adolescents living in a

challenging environment

Specific Objectives: (1) To empower adolescent s to make informed choices about reproductive health

issues of pregnancy and safe motherhood; (2) To reduce the rate of unintended

pregnancies, illegal abortions and school drop-outs; (3) Prevention of HIV/AIDS

transmission.

Beneficiaries: adolescents between 10 and 18 years, their teachers, parents and communities.

Activities: (1) Awareness creation through information sessions and psychological counseling focusing on the themes of safe motherhood, prevention of unintended pregnancies,

early marriages and STIs (2) Sensitization seminars for parents, teachers and

administrative staff of the schools

NAIROBI NUTRITIONAL PROJECT

Where: Slums of Nairobi North- East

Since: 2016

General Objective: Improvement of the nutritional and health status of pregnant women and children in

the slums of Nairobi North-East

<u>Specific Objectives:</u> improvement of access and fruition of nutritional services and the development of better Knowledge, Practice and Attitude in the sanitary and dietary field.

Beneficiaries: Women in the reproductive age, Children

<u>Activities:</u> (1) Support to the clinical, nutritional and formative activities of patients assisted at Ruaraka Uhai Neema Hospital and at the two minor clinics in the slums of Nairobi North-East

- (2) Health and nutritional education sessions in 10 schools
- (3) Peer-to peer education in the sanitary and nutritional field, promoted by the Life Skills Team in the targeted 10 schools





D. Socio-cultural Projects

BANJUKA PROJECT - A MUSIC & DANCE SCHOOL

Where: Babadogo, Nairobi.

Since: 2012

General Objective: To improve the overall health status and empower the youth of Nairobi North-Eastern slums through:

- (1) Promotions of talents among the young people in the slums
- (2) Promotions of life skills and education development through dance and music

Beneficiares: 90 youth aged 10-20, living in Babadogo and neighboring slum areas and particularly exposed to environmental risks.

Activities: Dance and Music classes, Public awareness performances for the community, Counselling services for the children





SLUM FILM FESTIVAL

A community-based event, organized on a an annual basis, which features stories about the lives of people living in urban slums. It is a celebration of the creativity of the filmmakers who live and work in the slums, it is an opportunity to promote (through a week of outdoor screenings) a wide range of movies, including the local communities that have limited access to the movies in general.



SLUM DUNK - HOOPS FOR KIDS



Where: Mathare slum in Nairobi/ Manyatta slum in Kisumu

Since: 2015

General Objective: To support youth/child development, by promoting sports and teaching Life Skills

Beneficiaries: 130 kids/youth from the surrounding slum, 100 parents/caregivers, 36 professional players and coaches, 480 students and 10 teachers

Activities: Basketball and Soccer academy, Life Skills sessions, psychological support, teachers' training on Life Skills




















..... A PARTNERSHIP FOR A SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

STRUTTURANTE

... a co-funding project in Masailand





This was achieved through a Mobile Clinic Program reaching 21 underserved communities, the support and empowerment of 25 first level health facilities: 23,028 women benefited from a comprehensive and accessible perinatal support: 14,184 children under 5 years and 12,987 children 6-15 years old got the chance to enjoy health care ranging from preventive to diagnostic and curative services.

Malnutrition

Kattado

8,557 talks where conducted with pregnant women and mothers held to promote better hygienic, food preparation and feeding practices. Moreover, **12,893** growth monitoring sessions were implemented, providing referrals to partnering facilities when necessary.

Reproductive Health

15,348 attendances of male and female community members were recorder at the several community advocacy meetings aimed at promoting RH rights and Family Planning uptake. At both school and community levels, Health Education and Safe Motherhood curricula were conducted and completed, with the attendance of **52,591** boys and girls.

Capacity Bulding

A comprehensive training program was implemented, whereby **364** Health Workers from public and private facilities underwent **21** modules. Furthermore, the project has sustained the County Healthcare Stakeholders Forum, for instance by providing technical assistance to its membership along with a dedicated website to improve coordination of stakeholders' activities in key areas of the healthcare sector.



Quality work in progress...



SafeCare has been established to support both public and private healthcare facilities to go through a stepwise improvement program to deliver safe and quality-secured care to their patients. SafeCare acts as the custodian of internationally recognized, unique sets of standards that are realistic for resource-restricted settings while not compromising on quality, safety and efficiency. Such standards are accredited by the International Society for Quality in Healthcare (ISQua), a global leader in quality



Ruaraka Uhai Neema Hospital has achieved Level 4 (out of 5) in Quality Healthcare

"F.A.R.E.!" - Facilities' Advancement and Referral Enhancement

A project carried out by World Friends Onlus, Oxfam Italy, The Meyer Pediatric Hospital and Engera, and co-financed by the Centre for Global Health, Tuscany Region, which provides assistance to 860 thousand people in different communities.

The aim is to provide qualified medical assistance for health emergencies relating to childbirth for 860 thousand people in two of the poorest areas of two African countries: the shanty towns in the North-eastern area of Nairobi in Kenya, and the Guraghe region in Ethiopia. The project involved 15 health structures of various levels together with the required health workers, and above all for women of reproductive age and their children, resident in the areas of the initiative.
